

LAW: STUDENTS SURVEY RESULTS

2019–2020 y. Autumn semester

REFERENCE PERIOD:

February 2020

AIM:

To study the *Law* students' the opinion on study subjects their quality, and teaching.

QUESTIONNAIRE:

Students studying at *Law* study programme evaluated the quality of study subjects according to 12 criteria. Rating scale: *Strongly Agree; Agree; Neither Agree nor Disagree; Disagree; Strongly Disagree*. Thirty-eight completed questionnaires were received.
