## **REFERENCE PERIOD:**

From September 2024 to February 2025

## AIM:

To analyze *Law* students' opinions on study courses and the quality of their teaching.

## **QUESTIONNAIRE:**

Students enrolled in the Law study programme evaluated the quality of study courses based on 14 criteria. The evaluation scale included the following options: Strongly Agree; Agree; NeitherAgree nor Disagree; Disagree; Strongly Disagree.
